# **HEAD LICE POLICY**



## **Policy Statement**

This Policy outlines the roles, responsibilities and expectations of the Service and parents to assist with a consistent and coordinated approach to treating and controlling head lice.

# **Strategies and Practices**

- The Head Lice Policy is available to families upon enrolment and staff upon induction.
- Parents will be kept up to date with accurate information on the detection, treatment and control of head lice.
- Educators are permitted to discreetly examine a child's hair should they observe the child demonstrating signs of discomfort. The dignity and rights of the child will be maintained at all times.
- Educators will ensure that children do not share hats or bedding at the Service.
- Parents are asked to check children's hair regularly for head lice. Parents are expected to ensure that their child
  does not attend the Service with untreated head lice, and are asked to check their own child's hair daily, once
  head lice have been detected in the Service.
- Parents of a child found to have head lice while at the Service will be contacted immediately to collect their child. The child can only reattend the Service the day after appropriate treatment has commenced and the child no longer has live head lice.
- The Service will notify all families when an outbreak of head lice has occurred at the Service, without individuals being identified.
- After a case of head lice has been detected in the Service, all items such as hats, bedding and dress-up clothes, which may have been used by the child, are washed in hot soapy water and dried accordingly.
